

Did You Know?

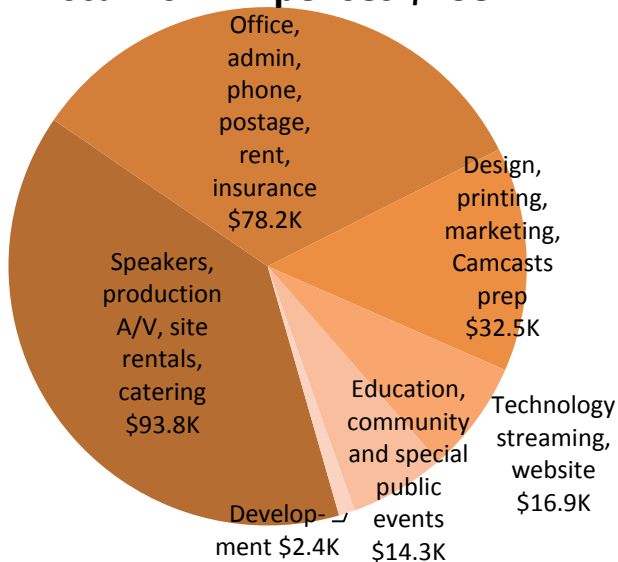
The Camden Conference is a nonprofit, non-partisan, educational organization whose mission is to foster informed discourse on world issues. A small group of State Department and CIA retirees founded the Conference in 1987. It quickly established itself because of interested, educated communities and academic institutions. While the original Conferences were held in the Camden Library, it soon expanded to the First Congregational Church, and then to the historic Camden Opera House.

Early Conferences set important precedents for the future: World-class speakers would focus on topics that shape major areas of U.S. foreign policy. The Conference would be non-partisan and balanced. There would be significant audience participation and student involvement. Importantly, a volunteer organization would run the Conference and its activities. Today the Conference has only one paid employee. Volunteers annually contribute more than 5,000 work hours on Conference projects.

The Conference early on created a Community Events Program to expand its impact and to better prepare people for the experience of the main February event. An Educational Outreach Program was initiated to directly involve university and high school students. Special Symposia are arranged around the theme of the Conference. Rapid sell-outs of the Opera House starting in 2006 led to venue expansion via live streaming to sites in Rockland and Belfast. In 2011, The Grand in Ellsworth became a new venue. The Conference now attracts more than 800 people each year. The 50-60 Community Events attract over 3,000 attendees. These are largely free and open to the public as a service to Maine communities from Damariscotta to Mount Desert Island. Increasing numbers of students attend the Conference via scholarship subsidies. The Conference collaborates with local libraries, the University of Maine, College of the Atlantic, Unity College, the Watershed School, the Farnsworth Museum, Bay Chamber Concerts, and Road Scholar (Elderhostel).

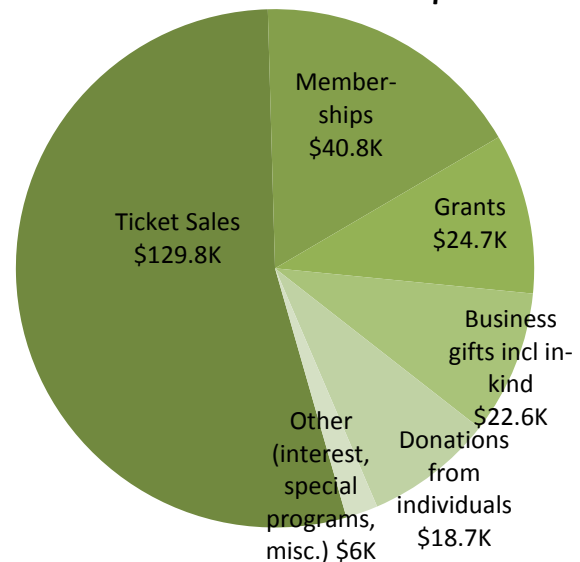
The Camden Conference has a significant positive financial impact on Maine: Attendees patronize local hotels, restaurants, and shops (in February!). The Conference uses local theaters, caterers, printers, designers, production, and streaming companies. Conference speakers become global ambassadors for MidCoast Maine based on their experiences here.

The cost of the Camden Conference annual program exceeds \$238,000. The pie charts show sources of revenue and expense for fiscal 2011. It is expensive to bring superb speakers from all over the world, to rent the facilities and equipment needed to produce a quality program, to arrange 50-60 Community Events, to have professional production, to ensure reliable live streaming, to supply needed catering, and to market the Conference and the Community Events effectively to potential attendees. Our goal is to cover over 70% of costs via ticket sales, memberships and individual donations. The Conference must raise the remainder from grants and from donations by foundations and businesses.
